


World Book Day

Three of our S2 pupils were winners of the Show Racism the Red Card poster entry. They were competing against a number of other Glasgow Schools and triumphed at this event with their poster depicting a girl looking in the mirror and actually visualizing herself as someone else as she believed the bad things that the other girls had been saying about her. The girls - Maaree O'Kane, Mariyah Anwar and Rachel Paterson won £200 of educational vouchers for the Social Subjects department who supported them, and also 30 tickets for a Rangers Football Team game. They also have a framed certificate to keep as a memento of this fantastic achievement.



CERN

As part of King's Park Secondary School's commitment to preparing pupils for forthcoming academic and life challenges, the Faculty of Science have just returned from a planned trip to the European Organisation for Nuclear Research (CERN) in Geneva. This took place during the Spring break and involved a group of 23 S5 pupils and 3 staff.

CERN is one of the world's largest and most respected centres for scientific research in fundamental physics where the world's largest and most complex scientific instruments are used to study the basic constituents of matter - the fundamental particles. By studying what happens when these particles collide, scientists learn about the laws of nature. CERN is also where the World Wide Web was born twenty years ago.

The trip also included a guided tour of the UN Palace of Nations where pupils learned more about the history of this famous organisation and the various activities in which it is involved.







Easter School

The school offered support to young people in S4-S6 in preparation for their SQA examinations. A number of subjects were represented throughout the 2 week spring break and a large number of young people came along. Thank you to the staff who supported this initiative and well done to pupils who came along – we are sure this will prove beneficial for you in preparation for your forthcoming examinations.

World of Work Day

53 pupils had the opportunity to talk to a number of local employers and businesses at the World of Work day held within the school. BSkyb, Strathclyde Fire and Rescue, Marks and Spencers, O2, City Building and City of Glasgow College were just some of the partners involved. This was a fantastic experience for them, which they thoroughly enjoyed. Pupils were engaged, well mannered and asked lots of questions. 

Geography Citizenship Project

Our S3 pupils have been developing their Geography field work skills by conducting research in the local area. They have been engaging in an environmental assessment of one of our community's local green spaces - Castlemilk Woodland Park. In an attempt to see how inviting the Park is to local users, the pupils visited the Woodland, recording the levels of litter and graffiti present. They also investigated how many activities there were for different individuals in the community, such as families, children, teenagers and the elderly. The pupils then exercised their civic duty as responsible citizens, writing to their local councilor, Baillie Ms Margot Clark, and the director of Land and Environmental Services with suggestions on how to improve the Park for the future. The pupils were thrilled when Ms Margot Clark recently contacted them, expressing her interest in visiting the school to hear more of the pupils' suggestions. The pupils are very excited about the prospect of presenting their findings to the council and Ms Clarke and are hopeful that this visit may help them improve their local green space for all who wish to visit. Glasgow Secondary Sports School of the Year 2012 - King's Park Secondary School



SQA Examinations

54/55 and 56 pupils are about to embark on their SQA examinations. Exam leave for 54 pupils runs from Thursday 25th April until Wednesday 5th June (inclusive) and 55/6 exam leave runs from Wednesday 8th May until Wednesday 5th June (inclusive). Although pupils are only due in school when they have an exam, any pupil requiring study facilities in school should speak to Miss Dougan and she will direct them. Pupils are **required to wear full school uniform during these SQA examinations**. Pupils must not come into school dressed in casual clothes. A copy of the SQA timetable has been issued to all pupils and is also on the school website. Miss Dougan has spoken with all pupils about our expectations of them during these examinations and has reminded them of the SQA rule that mobile phones <u>must not</u> be brought into the examination room. Pupils should leave mobile telephones at home and if you require to contact your child as a matter of urgency, you should contact the school office, who will be able to get a message to your child as soon as the examination is finished.

A REMINDER OF OUR CURRENT DRESS CODE

UNIFORM

- School tie (on sale from the school office £5)
- Plain white school shirt which buttons up to the neck short or long sleeve
- Black school trousers or plain black school skirt which MUST be knee length.
- Trousers must be black <u>school</u> trousers. Tight trousers, leggings, shorts, jeans, cargo pants, or fashion trousers of any kind are <u>not</u> permitted.
- Girls must a knee-length box pleat <u>school</u> skirt. We will not permit short skirts, short tube skirts, stretch skirts or fashion skirts of any kind
- Black socks
- Plain black school shoes, or plain black boots suitable for school
- Black v-neck school sweater or black school cardigan or black plain zipper
- OUTDOOR WEAR Following recommendations from the pupils, a hooded sweatshirt for outdoor wear will be permitted, ONLY if it is plain black with a full-length zip, so that the tie can be seen at all times. Like all outdoor garments, it must be removed in class. Pupils should not wear brightly coloured sweatshirts in school.

BLAZER-STYLE JACKETS FOR BOYS AND GIRLS

- For S1-S4 a black M &S fitted blazer-style jacket (or very similar garment) is RECOMMENDED.
- For S5 a black M&S fitted blazer-style jacket (or very similar garment) is STRONGLY RECOMMENDED.
- For S6 a black M&S fitted blazer-style jacket (or very similar garment) is **EXPECTED**.

 A high standard of uniform will be expected from all pupils who wish to join the Senior School of King's Park Secondary, because senior pupils are role models for the younger pupils and representatives of the school.

HATS AND CAPS

Pupils may wish to wear these in winter on the way to school, but they must be removed when in the school building.

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MAKE-UP/ JEWELLERY/HAIR/ACCESSORIES

- <u>Light</u> make-up only is permitted
- Jewellery should be kept to an absolute minimum.
- For girls who wish to wear a headband, a small plain black or white one will be permitted.
- The uniform should not be accessorised with gold/silver belts, chains, studs, etc.


OUTDOOR CLOTHING

It is essential that all outdoor clothing is removed, immediately on entering the classroom.

PE KIT

- INDOORS training shoes, navy t-shirt or polo shirt and shorts (or black shorts and black or white t-shirt or polo shirt)
- OUTDOORS suitable clothing for cold and possibly wet weather, including track suit bottoms. However tracksuits are only permissible from October until March. Indoor kit must also be brought.
- SWIMMING suitable swimwear. For example girls should wear a one-piece swimsuit or modest two-piece swimsuit, not a bikini.
- Pupils must bring PE kit for every single lesson. Even if they are injured and unable to take part fully in the lesson, they may be able to participate in a modified activity, and will be able to assist the teacher, eg with timekeeping. It is essential that they are dressed in
