Frequently Asked Questions Holidays During Term Time

Children should attend school every day of the session. Every day is important. Please help them not to miss any of this valuable time. We hope that the answers to your questions below will show that your child's education is too important to take holidays during term time.



1. Can I take my child on holiday during term time?

As a parent/carer, you can demonstrate your commitment to your child's education by, whenever possible, taking your holidays during school holidays.

2. Will the school let me take my child away during term time?

Guidelines from the Scottish Government indicate that a family holiday may only be authorised by the school if permission is sought from the school in advance, and the holiday is 'judged to be important to the well-being and cohesion of the family, following serious or terminal illness, bereavement or other traumatic causes'. The school will carefully consider parental requests, but the holiday will be authorised only in exceptional circumstances.

3. What happens if the school cannot authorise the absence?

If the school cannot authorise your request for leave of absence, your child's absence will be marked as "unauthorised" in the school register, in the same category as truancy.

4. Why shouldn't I take my child away during term time?

- It is important that children attend school regularly if they are to benefit from the learning opportunities provided.
- While the child is on holiday, the remainder of the class continue to be taught by the teacher, studying new
 topics and revising. Children who are absent from school due to a holiday in term time will miss out on
 important learning. They may never catch up. This will have an adverse impact on their progress and on their
 examination results.
- Teachers will not be able to provide work in advance, unless the holiday is authorised by the school. Teachers
 have a fixed amount of time to spend with pupils and try to use it wisely. They will always do their best to
 support pupils who have been absent through illness, or have been on an educational activity arranged with the
 approval of the school. Time spent in helping a child catch up after a holiday is time which is taken away from
 other pupils.

5. Who can I speak to about this?

A Reminder of our Dress Code – Black and White

Thank you to parents/carers for your support in making sure that pupils come to school wearing the following:



- a white shirt or blouse
- a **black** skirt or trousers (Smart black trousers cropped, eg **to the knee**, are accepted, but shorts are not acceptable. A very short skirt is not acceptable.)
- black school zipped sweatshirt (some on sale from the school office £10), or black cardigan, or v-neck jumper
- school tie. The tie must be clearly visible at all times. Ties are on sale (£5) from the school office
- black shoes

The following items are NOT acceptable:



- Clothing which is clearly unsuitable for a place of work, e.g. very short skirts, crop tops, leggings, shorts, very tight trousers, jeans, cargo pants, very brightly coloured and decorated shoes
- Jewellery and accessories which are unsuitable or constitute a health and safety hazard eg long pendant chains, large hooped earrings, heavy rings, diamante earrings, sequined or gold/silver belts, chains and studs.
- Heavy makeup and very bright or black nail varnish is also discouraged.
- Tracksuits, clothing made of flammable material
- Football colours
- Clothing promoting designer brands, drugs or alcohol.
- Pupils should remove all outdoor jackets in class, as well as anything not conforming to the guidelines for school uniform, eg bright colours, striped tops.



We do not endorse any particular shop for school uniform. However, please do not buy unsuitable clothing which is sold in some supermarkets, labelled as school uniform, eg very short black skirts, tight trousers, blouses which are unsuitable for a school tie, etc.

Some of the school skirts on sale in Marks and Spencer are of a suitable length.

As this term draws to a close, it remains to thank all those at the school who are moving on to new places, for everything they have brought to King's Park and to wish them all a very happy and successful future. As is often pointed out by visitors to the King's Park, there is strong sense of a caring community in the school and everyone plays a vital part in that.

There is however one person who deserves special thanks and recognition for her outstanding efforts and enthusiasm over a number of years, both as a parent and as chairperson of the Parent Council, and that person is Janie Munro.



Curriculum for Excellence

You can find out more about Curriculum for Excellence on www.ltscotland.org.uk. Or follow the Curriculum for Excellence link on the front page of our school website.

- ✓ The new Scottish curriculum will provide a coherent educational experience for all pupils from age 3 until age 18 (instead of 5-14, Standard Grade etc).
- ✓ It will include activities which were once called 'extra-curricular', eg clubs, sports teams, excursions, and skills developed in the community, scouts, guides etc.
- Our aim is that the new curriculum will have challenge and enjoyment, breadth, progression, depth, personalisation and choice, coherence and relevance.

- ✓ Learning will be more interactive, with clearer links between one subject and another.
- ✓ The pupils who join S1 in August next session will be the first pupils to be awarded the Scottish Certificate in Literacy, and the Scottish Certificate in Numeracy at the end of S3.
- ✓ From S4 onwards, they will also sit National 4, National 5, Higher and possibly Advanced Higher courses.
- ✓ The new curriculum is not only about qualifications. It aims to help young people to become

 - Effective contributors
